**CONVENTION PROGRAM.** The program is arranged in specialty areas which conveniently separate the various areas of study in behavior analysis. The various formats of presentations within each of these specialty areas include:

Business Meetings. Business meetings for various Committees and Special Interest Groups within ABA are scheduled during the Convention to provide an opportunity for members to express opinions to the representatives of the group conducting the meeting and to the Association. When so indicated, these meetings are open to all interested persons.

**Group Conversation Hours.** Group Conversation Hours follow many invited addresses and invited symposia. These sessions generally replace the customary question—and—answer period at the end of the formal presentations.

**Invited Addresses.** ABA invites distinguished individuals to give 20 or 50 minutes presentations throughout the Convention.

**Papers.** Paper sessions are 15-20 minute presentations of a research project delivered by one person. Two or three papers in a specialty area are often combined for a one-hour presentation.

Poster Sessions. Information relevant to a research project is posted and the author is available for 90-minutes to discuss the project. This format provides the opportunity for discussion between presenters and the audience. One prize for excellence is awarded by the poster session host of each specialty area presented when warranted.

**Pre-Convention Institute.** The Pre-Convention Institute allows for more lengthy presentations than is possible during the Convention. Although the PCI is not a formal prerequisite for entry into Convention workshops, the offerings of the Institute and the convention have been arranged, where possible, to take advantage of the sequential nature of the subject matter.

Seminars. These sessions provide the opportunity for practical training in the field of behavior analysis. A wide range of topics are presented, and a seminar may require prerequisite skills. Many of the seminars emphasize techniques for behavior change and provide materials so that the participant may continue to use the techniques upon returning to their research or service site. Seminars are not offered for continuing education credit. Accordingly, records of participation in seminars are not maintained by ABA. The various offerings are identified as introductory, intermediate, or advanced.

Symposia. A symposium consists of several paper presentations on a related topic delivered by persons from different research,

service, or academic institutions.

The Association for Behavior Analysis is approved by Workshops. the American Psychological Association to sponsor continuing education programs in psychology. One of the primary objectives of ABA is to provide educational opportunities for members and other professionals to review recent research, discuss current theoretical issues, and learn new methods of the application of behavior analysis to societal problems. While ABA does not require participation in the continuing education program for Association membership, ABA strongly recommends involvement in the The Continuing Education Program does not provide the necessary educational foundation for entry into the discipline of psychology, nor is the program intended to prepare individuals to alter the direction of a professional career. The Continuing Education Program is designed to meet the academic needs of self-improvement and to provide continuing academic training as required by many licensing associations and specialty boards. The Continuing Education Program has been arranged to permit convention participants to enroll in a number of workshops which have been identified by the area of study and continuing education credits. The following statement will accompany workshops:

"The Association for Behavior Analysis is approved by the American Psychological Association to sponsor continuing education in pscyhology. This program is offered for hours of continuing education credit." (One contact hour

equals one credit hour.)

The record of these continuing education credits, which are **not** equivalent to university credit hours, will be recorded by ABA and the American Psychological Association Continuing Education Credit Registry. Participants will be provided documentation of the earned credits by the Registry Service, and a record of continuing education will be maintained by ABA.

REPRINTS OF PRESENTATIONS AT THE ABA CONVENTION. Presenters are listed in the Program Book and Supplement by name and affiliation. If the affiliation is a university or college, your local library should be able to provide you with the complete mailing address for the presenter. If the affiliation is not a university or college, we request that the city and state be listed. If this information is given, it is published in the Program Book and Supplement. Your library should be able to give you a complete mailing address.

#### ABA CERTIFICATION EXAMINATION

What Is It? This is the fourth year that ABA is offering a general exam as the first stage of certification as a Behavior Analyst. The purpose of the general exam is to assess the applicant's verbal competency with respect to basic behavioral principles and to establish the applicant's eligibility for his/her practicing or specialty competency in behavior analysis (stage two of the ABA certification). The form of the exam is multiple choice with some essays including analysis of "behavioral vignettes". The second stage of certification involves a more extensive assessment and monitoring of performance in an area of specialization (e.g. behavioral clinical, behavior analysis in education).

Who Can Take It? Eligibility criteria for taking the general exam are: (1) working on minimal degree required in one's area of professional training in the human services; and (2) membership in

ABA (full, student, or affiliate). Why Certify? Certification allows the professional same formal indicator of his/her competence as a practicing behavior analyst. In addition, current professional licensing or certification procedures in some disciplines, particularly psychology, are limited to doctoral level practitioners. Yet within the field of



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

Some students do not understand basic concepts, even when presented orally, and need work on recitation skills, basic thinking operations such as deductions and analogies, and common information. Other students require similar instruction, but in written exercises, on thinking skills and common information. 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
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
