

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
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INFANT/CHILD BEHAVIOR & DEVELOPMENT SIG

The working plan of the INFANT/CHILD BEHAVIOR &DEVELOPMENT SIG is to consider the determinants of behavior in a developmental frame, and relevant methodolgies and research tactics for work with different species, particularly the human, from the prenatal period through childhood. The new SIG will facilitate the dissemination of research questions, methods, and findings, providing a forum for collegial interchange in this specialty area among ABA members, within ABA and in other organizations that deal with early human behavior and development (including those that have not heretofore been hospitable to the assumptions, methods, and conceptualizations of behavior analysis). The idea is for behavior analytic work on young humans within ABA to be focused and facilitated by the SIG. Further, behavior analytic symposia, invited addresses, and paper sessions in societies other than ABA in which SIG members are also members might be focused and facilitated by the Infant/Child Behavior and Development SIG. These other organizations include ISIS, SRCD, APA Divisions 7, 12, 15, 16, 25, 33, 37, and 41, APS, Kohlberg Society, Piaget Society, AME, and ISSBD.

Goals for the present year are to detail the SIG's objectives, establish a communications network (including a newsletter), and plan a program of sessions highlighting infant/child behavior and development for the 1992 ABA meeting. In addition, the SIG might expedite the preparation of an introductory textbook on child developmental psychology, for use by behaviorally-oriented instructors. The initial organizational SIG meeting will be in May in Atlanta.

Habilitation for Profoundly Multiply Handicapped Clients: Past, Present, and Future. Rodney E. Realon, M.A., Jim Phillips, Ph.D., Martin Ivancic, Ph.D. Western Carolina Center-Morganton, NC

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: All three presenters are Psychologists at Western Carolina Center and have extensive experience in programming with clients who are handicapped.

DESCRIPTION: Programming for profoundly multiply handicapped clients is a challenge for all disciplines due to the many physical, sensory, and cognitive limitations that are encountered. Our experience over the years has shown that many activities and programs can be developed to assist these clients in attaining greater independence. The workshop will provide a review of the literature, and review treatments for common problem behaviors such as handmouthing, self-injury, and rumination. The following also will be described: how to do reinforcer assessments; how to teach leisure skills using electronic devices; how to manage living environments; and how to stay informed of developing trends and innovations. Participants will receive an outline of the areas covered, a bibliography of research conducted with profoundly multiply handicapped populations, and will be provided an opportunity to discuss issues related to serving this population. The first part will discuss behavior diagnostics and program methods appropriate for profoundly handicapped clients. The next part will discuss arranging the environment, promoting engagement, structuring the day, and future developments in working with profoundly handicapped persons. The third part will address methods antecedent services and reinforcer assessments with profoundly handicapped persons.

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: Dr. Malott received his Ph.D. from Columbia University and is Professor of Psychology at Western Michigan University; he also is a member of the editorial board of the *Journal of Organizational Behavior Management* and has published extensively in the OBM field. Satoru Shimamune received his MA from Keio University and is a Ph.D. Candidate at Western Michigan University. Maria Emma Malott received her Ph.D. from Western Michigan University and is Production Manager at Ronningen Research and Development Corporation in Vicksburg, Michigan.

DESCRIPTION: The participants will acquire skills in the analysis of complex human behavior and contingencies in organizational settings. They will learn to discriminate between control by direct-acting contingencies of reinforcement and punishment and control by indirect-acting rule-governed analogues to such contingencies. Using multi-media presentations, participants will review some basic and advanced concepts of rule-governed behavior and their applications to the organizational behavior management literature. Behavioral Principles in College Teaching: A Comprehensive Survival Course for Career Choice and Social and Academic Skills. Roger W. McIntire, Ph.D., Donald K. Pumroy, Ph.D., University of Maryland

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: Dr. McIntire is Associate Dean for Undergraduate Studies at the University of Maryland--College Park. Dr. Pumroy is Professor of Psychology at University Maryland--College Park and Coordinator of the ABA Special Interest Group for Behavior Analysis in the Regular Classroom.

DESCRIPTION: Graduation rates in colleges and universities are as low as 50% for some freshman classes and as low as 10% for some minority groups. Behavioral deficits in academic skills are an important part this problem. Behavioral technology can provide the basis for the development of important skills for student who fail and increase the success rate for those who are at risk. Workshop participants will review a complete freshmen survival course and will practice presentations of assignments and exercises used for General Education 100 at College Park. The 200-page workbook used in the course will be provided and will guide workshop activities. These activities include: classroom behavior, study and test-taking strategies, practice of social skills, time management, career exploration. Assignments in the 3-credit course will be practiced in miniature. The overall objective of the workshop is to prepare participants to teach the course described by the presenters and workshop handouts. Outcome data (GPA, credits earned academic progress and retention) of the last three semesters will be presented to illustrate the effectiveness of the course. These data show performance of students in the course nearly one full grade-point higher than control subjects (N=300).

An Ecobehavioral Model for Intervention in Educational Settings. Kari Bartlebaugh, M.A., Glynnis E. Cowdery, M.A., Mike Kullman, M.A., Ronnie Detrich, M.A., Spectrum Center for Educational and Behavioral Development, Inc., Berkeley, CA

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: All presenters are member of the staff of an inschool consultation program operated by Spectrum Center. All have extensive experience in the design and implementation of behavioral programs for students in regular and special education classrooms.

DESCRIPTION: The objective of this workshop is to describe how an ecobehavioral model of intervention can help organize the vast array of information available to the behavior analyst into a meaningful data base for making decisions about interventions. An ecobehavioral model of education assumes that student behavior, either academic or social. is a function of the interaction between structural and social variables in the classroom, e.g., the structure imposed by the scheduled activities and the frequency and timing of interactions with the teaching staff. At the conclusion of the workshop, participants should be able to: (1) describe the relevant ecological variables in an educational setting, (2) describe a system for gathering meaningful data about each of the relevant variables, (3) describe how the data can be used to develop effective interventions, and (4) describe how to involve teaching staff in the development of interventions that increase the probability of compliance with the planned intervention. Participants in the workshop will receive a brief written conceptual description of an ecobehavioral model, sample data systems, and worksheets to guide their practices as they begin to implement these concepts in their settings.

Managing Professional Performance in Human Service Organizations. Martin J. Pollack, Ph.D., Southbury Training School, Southbury, CT, Richard Fleming, Ph.D., Auburn University, Beth Sulzer-Azaroff, Ph.D., University of Massachusetts

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: Dr. Sulzer-Azaroff is an active researcher and consultant in Performance Management. She has published extensively in the field and is a member of the Board of Editors of the Journal of Organizational Behavior Management. Dr. Pollack has implemented numerous programs in human service settings and is an experienced consultant. Dr. Fleming has been active in research and application in the field and has specialized in applications of performance management in training programs for persons with developmental disabilities.

DESCRIPTION: Performance management principles will be introduced. Participants will be provided with a user friendly model for introducing and maintaining a performance management system within their organizations. Established formats, materials and exercises will be shared to facilitate demonstration of competence. Emphasis will be on the application of performance management strategies with professional staff in human service settings. The focus will include goals of increased productivity and improved quality in professional products. Methods are designed to encourage and support active research in performance management.

Functional Analytic Psychotherapy. Robert J. Kohlenberg, Ph.D., University of Washington

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: Dr. Kohlenberg is Professor of Psychology at University of Washington--Seattle. He has published several papers on the topic of Functional Analytic Psychotherapy (see reference below). His workshops on this topic have been praised by ABA members and have been in demand consistently year after year.

DESCRIPTION: Outpatient, adult psychotherapy is the most common form of treatment administered by psychologists. Most treatment procedures--behavioral and cognitive--have developed within this framework. Unfortunately, Radical Behaviorism has minimally, if at all, influenced current day outpatient treatment methods. This workshop will take steps to remedy this problem by introducing a system of outpatient, adult psychotherapy that is based on radical behaviorism. The topics to be covered are (1) the implications of using reinforcement, specification of clinically relevant behaviors, and arrangement for generalization in a clinical setting. (2) The subtle meanings of verbal behavior. (3) Alternatives to cognitive therapy. (4) A radical behavioral approach to being emotional and remembering the forgotten. Video-tapes of clinical sessions will be used to illustrate the methods and give participants training in the discrimination of relevant client behaviors that are the focus of the treatment system.

ENROLLMENT LIMIT: 30 ACADEMIC LEVEL: Introductory

RECOMMENDED EXPERIENCE: Three audiences are targeted: (1) behavior analysts with no therapy experience, (2) behavior therapists who want additional methods, and (3) psychodynamic therapists seeking alternative methods.

Behavioral Management of the Typical College Content Course. Jack Michael, Ph.D., Western Michigan University

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: Since 1968, Dr. Michael has been developing and using an instructional system appropriate to graduate and undergraduate courses. In 1971 he received one of the American Psychological Foundation's Distinguished Teaching Awards and was one of the Master Lecturers at the 1983 convention of the American Psychological Association; in 1984 he was awarded the Alumni Distinguished Teaching Award of Western Michigan University; and in1989 was Distinguished Faculty Scholar.

DESCRIPTION: This workshop will present a way to teach typical courses so that most of the students study regularly and learn most of the course content. The system involves the use of study objectives to guide the students' contact with the text and lecture material, essay exams as the main means of assessment, and the use of exam grades and the course grade as the primary motivational variables. Skills covered will include (1) the preparation of effective study objectives, (2) the proper use of lectures, (3) the integration of lecture and text material, and (4) the design and grading of effective exams. The workshop will also present information on the general importance of such content courses, how to lecture effectively, the possible role of discussion and laboratory activities, how to enjoy teaching and avoid burnout, and a number of other issues relevant to functioning in an academic setting.

DESCRIPTION: This presentation will focus on strategies and tactics for treating severe behavior problems such as self-injury, aggression, pica, rumination, and extreme noncompliance in clients with developmental disabilities and related disorders. The lecture, discussion and handouts will review major aspects of developing, conducting, and evaluating treatment including: analyzing the biological and environmental variables maintaining the problem, rearranging ecological and antecedent conditions which differentially control appropriate and inappropriate behavior, teaching functional alternative skills, and programming for generalization and maintenance of improvement. In addition to the clinical dimensions of treatment, the presentation will focus on administrative and organizational issues in managing residential and day treatment environments, and on social problems, standards, and guidelines which effect and regulate treatment of severe behavior disorders.

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: Dr. Dyer is Director of Research and Training at the May Institute in Chatham, MA. She has over 14 years experience in conducting research in a broad range of areas including language development, staff training, and learning characteristics of autistic children. Dr. Lifter is an Assistant Professor of Special Education at Northeastern University. She received her doctoral training in psychology from Columbia University, and her postdoctoral training in developmental disabilities and applied behavior analysis at the University of Massachusetts. Her current research concerns single subject design intervention studies for teaching developmentally appropriate play activities to young children with disabilities.

DESCRIPTION: Methods for evaluating and facilitating the social, communicative, and play behaviors of children with developmental disabilities will be presented within a developmental/behavioral perspective. Participants will learn how to first assess play, social, and communicative behaviors of these children. Then, guidelines will be presented for facilitating the initial acquisition of these behaviors, as well as strategies to promote generalization and maintenance of these behaviors in natural settings.

Comparing Traditional Elementary Math Basals and a Direct Instruction Alternative. Siegfried Engelmann, Ph.D., Douglas Carnine, Ph.D., Bernadette Kelly, Ph.D., The Center on Improving Mathematics Instruction, Eugene, Oregon

PRESENTER HIGHLIGHTS: Bernadette Kelly received her Ph.D. from the University of Oregon in 1986. She has recently returned to the United States from South Africa where she was training elementary school teachers in the Black homeland of Gazankulu. She is currently co-authoring a fifth-grade Direct Instruction mathematics curriculum.

DESCRIPTION: The Center on Improving Mathematics Instruction for Handicapped Students has conducted a review of relevant research literature; and, based on this review, the Center evaluated math basals and a Direct Instruction alternative. The evaluation criteria have to do with lesson organization, use of time, rate for introducing concepts, background knowledge, clarity of communication, and provision of guided practice, independent practice, and review. The research base for each criterion will be summarized and illustrations will be provided from math basals and the Direct Instruction alternatives. Implications for radical change in math achievement of lowperforming students will be discussed. The workshop will include lecture, discussion, group work and individual evaluation activities to equip participants with background information and practical skills for selecting, using and modifying a mathematics curriculum.

Dick Bathrick, M.A., Community Intervention Director, Kathleen Carlin, M.S.W, Executive Director, Gus Kaufman, Ph.D., Clinical Director, David Myers, Ph.D., Consultant, Sulaiman Nuriddin, M.A., Consultant, Men Stopping Violence, Inc., Atlanta, GA

DESCRIPTION: This workshop will involve experiential and didactic exposure to the following issues related to eliminating men's behavior of abuse and battering of women: historical roots and contemporary institutionalized practices of woman abuse; personal experiences of and attitudes toward domination and abuse of women; societal interventions to end abuse of women and promote their safety; and education and behavior change programs which can help men stop battering. Several outcomes are planned: (1) Participants will describe the historial roots and current pervasive nature of violence against women. Each participant will be asked to describe his or her earliest memory of physical abuse of a women. Each participant will be given time to remember the event and then will be asked to described it to the group. (2) Each participant will describe societal interventions which can help provide safety for the victim, and which can reduce a man's probability of battering. (3) In an exercise done in groups of 2 or 3, each participant will describe what s/he would do, when presented with a woman who is battered to put her safety first. (4) Each participant will describe supervised re-education and behavior change programs for men who batter.

While contributing key elements to modern behavior analysis, social or paradigmatic behaviorism also has developed apart as a new generation behaviorism, with bridges with which to interlace with psychology. Thoroughly behavioral, paradigmatic behaviorism has developed other features--such as a behavioristic theory of personality--that allow it to utilize non-behavioral, psychological knowledge in a manner that enables behaviorism to become a general psychology. The workshop will introduce the philosophy, the basic learning theory, and other major conceptual, methodological, and empirical developments that provide generally heuristic framework for behaviorists, the basis for needed new developments.
