

#### Purpose

The Association for Behavior Analysis is dedicated to advancing the science of behavior and its application. It encompasses contemporary scientific and social issues, theoretical advances, and the dissemination of professional and public information. ABA's activities include membership services (e.g., special interest groups), journal support (The Behavior Analyst), directories (e.g., graduate training), a newsletter with four issues per year, and an annual convention. ABA is affiliated with 34 state, regional. and international chapters, and actively promotes the international development of behavior analysis.

#### Background

ABA began in May, 1974 with a planning meeting at the University of Chicago; the first annual convention was held the year following. Its past presidents are Nathan H. Azrin, Donald M. Lindsley, Jack Michael, Edward K. Morris, Henry S. Pennypacker, Ellen P. Reese, Beth Sulzer Azaroff, and Julie S. Vargas. Numerous other scientists, scholars and practitioners in psychology. sociology, education, philosophy, business and rehabilitation have contributed to its governance. The journal, The Behavior Analyst (ISSN o738-6729), began publication in 1978.

#### Membership

ABA currently has more than 2,400 paid members, including a significant international representation. Annual membership dues are \$90.00; students pay \$35.00; chapter affiliates pay \$30.00. All



#### **Presentation Formats**

Addresses are presentations of theoretical, philosophical or methodological issues.

Invited Address speakers are invited by a Specialty Area Coordinator to present information which is new, innovative, or otherwise important to the Specialty Area. They are usually members of the Association.

A few guest speakers are invited each year with the approval of the President and President Elect. Guest speakers have made significant contributions in areas compatible with behavior analysis.

Meetings are held during the Convention by ABA Committees, Chapters, Special Interest Groups, and other groups. Anyone may attend the meetings unless the meeting is specified as a "closed" meeting.

Panels are moderated discussion with panel members responding to a theme.

Poster Sessions are displays of information relevant to data-based research projects; authors are available for 60- or 90-minute time periods to discuss the project.

Symposia consist of a series of moderated related speeches by different people with no interaction between the speakers.

Workshops review recent research, discuss current theoretical issues, and present new methods for the application of behavior analysis.

#### **CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAM**

The Association for Behavior Analysis (ABA) is an organization approved by the American Psychological Association to offer continuing education for psychologists. One of the primary objectives of ABA is to provide educational opportunities for members and other professionals to review recent research, to discuss current theoretical issues, and to learn new methods of application of behavior analysis to societal problems. While ABA does not require participation in the continuing education program for Association membership, involvement in the program is encouraged. The Continuing Education Program is designed to meet the academic needs of selfimprovement and to provide continuing academic training as required by many licensing associations and specialty boards. The record of these continuing education credits, which are not equivalent to university credit hours, will be maintained by ABA. ## Introduction to Standard Celeration Charting.

OGDEN R. LINDSLEY (Behavior Research Company - Lawrence, KS), John O. Cooper (Ohio State University, Columbus, OH), Elizabeth Haughton (Haughton Learning Center - Napa, CA), Jim Pollard (Mediplex Lowell, Inc. - Lowell, MA), Clay Starlin (Western Regional Center - Eugene, OR), William D. Wolking, (University of Florida - Gainesville, FL).

**Description:** How to Read and Make Standard Celeration Charts.

Objectives: Throughout the entire workshop instructors coach as participants: (1) Read frequencies, celerations, celeration differences, turns, jumps, bounces, and outlier probabilities from Standard Celeration Charts at 60 per minute. (2) Chart frequencies on daily, weekly, monthly, and yearly Standard Celeration Charts at 10 per minute.

Activities: Morning: Paced choral reading (Point-See-Say) at 60 per minute of frequencies, celerations, turns, jumps, bounces, and outlier probabilities from Standard Celeration Chart practice sheets.

Afternoon: Each participant charts from tables of daily, weekly, monthly and yearly frequencies at 10 dots per minute.

Coaches assist the instant a participant hesitates.

Participants are given materials and shown how to continue daily charting practice on their own to reach fluency above 30 dots correct per minute.

Target Audience: Graduate students, faculty, researchers, and consultants who have

heard about Standard Celeration Charting, but have no opportunity to learn how. Here is your chance! This proven workshop works!

Teaching Behavior Analysis: How to Develop, Produce, and Use SAFMEDS.

STEPHEN A. GRAF (Youngstown State University - Youngstown, OH)

Description: SAFMEDS, an acronym for "Say All Fast Minute Every Day Shuffled", represent a procedure to promote fluency in verbal behavior developed by Ogden Lindsley some 15 years ago. Learners see information on the front of a card and attempt to say a brief appropriate response which can be found on the back. The use of the technique by Precision Teachers has provided an easy way to monitor learning large numbers of facts and concepts. Enhanced retention of material, endurance of behavior, ease of applications to new material, and objective performance standards have been reported by users and practitioners.

Objectives: Participants should be able to: (1) Develop sets of SAFMEDS for content areas in which they teach or train which conform to the rules provided and explained in the workshop. (2) Produce SAFMEDS masters from the Macintosh-based templates for Microsoft Word or Publish it Easy! provided to them as part of their materials. (3) Reproduce sets of SAFMEDS for students or trainees. (4) Implement the use of SAFMEDS in various settings, structuring

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practice timings to interface smoothly within classroom or training sessions.

Activities: (1) Practice with conversion of different types of information to SAFMEDS. (2) Discussion of using the templates provided to produce SAFMEDS masters on the Macintosh to be printed as decks on card stock. (3) Discussion of alternatives for making the SAFMEDS available to students, clients, or trainees. (4) Demonstration of how to run timing with small or large groups. (5) Practice in use of Standard Celebration Charts to monitor SAFMEDS daily. (6) Discussion of how to incorporate SAFMEDS into larger patterns of learning.

Target Audience: Participants in this workshop should already have competent subject matter repertoires, but be interested in promoting fluent verbal behavior in specialty areas for students, clients, or employees they teach or train.

## Radical Behaviorism and the Counseling Process.

JACK WILLIAMS (University of Waterloo - Waterloo, Ontario)

Description: This workshop will relate elements of the radical behavioral viewpoint to various standard practices, strategies, and concepts that are part of the contemporary counselling/psychotherapy. The aim is to help provide attendees who are interested and/or familiar with radical behaviorism with the ability to begin using this perspective when working with clients. It will also be of interest to those with a counseling background who wish to explore how some of

their approaches are related to this perspective.

(3) To provide beginning practical experience in using some of these perspectives and methods.

## Critical Thinking in Clinical Practice: Sources of Error and How to Avoid Them.

EILEEN GAMBRILL (University of California at Berkeley - Berkeley, CA)

Description: Increased attention has been devoted to the description of errors that often occur in making clinical decisions. The purpose of this workshop is to identify sources of error, to describe why they occur and to suggest remedies for avoiding them. This workshop will help participants to become knowledgeable about and to take advantage of recent theory and research in

the areas of reasoning, judgment and inference to enhance the quality of practice decisions.

Objectives: Objectives of this workshop are to enhance skills in identifying sources of errors in making practice decisions and identify useful remedies to decrease their likelihood.

Activities: The framework presented integrates theory and research concerning problem-solving, critical thinking and cognitive biases. The kinds of errors likely to occur in different phases (assessment, intervention and evaluation) will be described and checklists offered to avoid them. Personal and environmental factors that may compromise the quality of decisions made in group conferences will be described as well as remedies for them. Vignettes illustrating errors will be used as well as exercises demonstrating common errors and remedies.

## Teaching Language to Autistic and Developmentally Disabled Children.

MARK L. SUNDBERG (Behavior Analysts, Inc. - Danville, CA)

Description: In this workshop participants will learn how to use the basic concepts from Skinner's analysis of verbal behavior (i.e., mands, tacts and intraverbals) to assess and provide language skills training for autistic and developmentally disabled children. In addition, participants will learn how to establish a language based environment

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which can be implemented across both home and school settings.

Objectives: A major emphasis will be placed on identifying methods to enhance and utilize motivational variables (establishing operations) to teach language in both structured teaching sessions and in ongoing activities including playtime.

Activities: Methods of data collection and tracking will also be presented, along with techniques for coordinating the ongoing decision making necessary for effective language intervention. Issues such as facilitated communication, sign language, symbol boards, and disruptive behavior will also be discussed.

Hypercard as a Research, Instructional, and Personal Productivity Tool.

WILLIAM F. POTTER (California State University, Stanislaus - Turlock, CA), Matthew A. Mason (Western Psychiatric Association, Pittsburgh, PA)

Description: Participants will be introduced to Hypercard and Hypertalk (the Hypercard programming language). This application (and similar ones for the PC environment) can be utilized for research, instructional or personal productivity purposes. For example, clinicians might find Hypercard useful for creating a personal client database, or

creating a report maker. Researcher's may program experimental contingencies and record data given subject inputs via the keyboard or mouse, with relevant data collected by the computer (e.g., stimulus equivalence, matching and delayed matching to sample). Instructors will find it easy to develop Computer Assisted Instruction incorporating sound, graphics, evaluations, record keeping, and a host of response measures.

Objectives: Training Objectives: (1) Acquaint the user with Hypercard and Hypertalk (the English-like programming language). (2) Participants will learn how to navigate through Hypercard applications. (3) Participants will learn the nature of, and how to create stacks, backgrounds, cards, buttons, and fields. (4) Participants will learn how to create graphics and import graphics into a Hypercard stack. (5) Participants will learn the basics of Hypertalk. (6) Investigate and demonstrate some of the possible research and instructional applications of Hypercard.

Activities: A number of Hypercard stacks will be given to the participants including a grade converter, a basic tutorial and evaluation of Hypercard, an article 'summarize' with key words/reference/and printing capabilities, a delayed matching to sample program, and others. All of these programs will be reviewed and are modifiable by the participant and the "code" or programming script can be reviewed, and modified by the participant.

During this workshop, participants will follow the instructors' presentations using both a workbook and a Macintosh computer with a Hypercard application developed for this workshop. Note: computers will be provided; depending on enrollment, participants should expect 2-3 people per computer.

#### Rule-Governed Behavior, Self-Management, and Performance Management.

RICHARD W. MALOTT (Western Michigan University - Kalamazoo, MI)

Description: Behavior analysis often seems simplistic in its treatment of the behavior human beings. For instance, people work or fail to work toward the distant goal of a college degree. How can we understand this in terms of something so simple as the rat's pressing a lever and immediately getting a drop of water? Lacking a plausible behavioral analysis, many clients, parents, teachers, staff, students, and professionals opt for cognitive or mentalistic analyses. This workshop provides a radical-behavioral alternative, by introducing the concepts of rule-governed behavior, direct-acting and indirect-acting contingencies, analog contingencies, rules that are hard and easy to follow, the myth of delayed gratification, the three-contingency model of performance management, the performance management model of cultural change, and contingency diagramming. These concepts help us rigorously relate the simple contingencies affecting laboratory animals to the complex contingencies affecting human beings in their daily lives. Also, we can understand better problems of self-management and performance management in applied settings. And we can design better self-management and performance-management systems.

Objectives: The students should understand and agree with 75% of the theoretical

analysis presented; this will involve an analysis of direct and indirect-acting behavioral contingencies. These contingencies will include natural contingencies, performance-management contingencies, and theoretical contingencies. (In a sixhour workshop, students will not achieve fluency with this complex verbal repertoire. But the students will acquire a sufficient repertoire and sufficient additional resources to independently continue working toward the achievement of fluency.)

Activities: This format is called the structured-seminar format - participants: (1) do paper-based workbook exercises (2) do slide-show based "workbook" exercises (3) diagram behavioral contingencies on transparencies (4) present their exercises and transparencies (5) react to the workbook exercises and participant presentations with group response cards in addition to oral comments and analyses (6) spend a minimal amount of time listening to lectures.

Target Audience: This seminar is appropriate for behavior analysts in all areas, with a general knowledge of the concepts and principles of behavior.

## How to Make Your Program Survive After the Research is Over.

L. KEITH MILLER (University of Kansas - Lawrence, KS)

**Description:** Methods for promoting the survival of behavioral programs after the research is over.

Objectives: (1) Each participant will learn how to evaluate the survival of their

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program through direct observation. (2) They will learn the five most important features that promote program survival. (3) They will learn how to build these features into their program. (4) They will learn how to test and revise their program until it survives. (5) They will learn how to use single subject experiments to analyze the "survival" features they have added to their program.

Activities: Participants will view a light hearted slide show describing a typical behavioral program. They will analyze the features of that program that promote or impede survival and design an intervention to promote survival. They will formulate methods to directly observe program survival in that setting. They will design a single subject analysis of their intervention. They will then work in teams to apply the same approach to a behavioral program they are using or have used.

## Using Statistical Process Control to Make Data-Based Clinical Decisions.

ALBERT PFADT (NYS Institute for Basic Research - Staten Island, NY)

Description: Statistical process control (SPC) methods include a number of simple mathematical procedures and problemsolving techniques with powerful applications in industrial manufacturing operations. Perhaps the most widely known involves

the use of "control charts" to graphically display measures of location (central tendency) and dispersion (variability) which are obtained by monitoring the output of a work process. These "running records" are then analyzed using statistically-based decision rules which function as judgmental aids. Control charts help to distinguish abnormal patterns of variation (due to "assignable causes") from "common causes" of variation, which are features of how the system normally functions when no extraneous influences are present. Their use is associated with the management philosophy of Dr. W. Edwards Deming, who is regarded as "the father of the third wave of the industrial revolution." A special issue of the Journal of Applied Behavioral Analysis (Fall, 1992) considered how the principles of SPC can be extended to analyze performance problems in a variety of contexts, including clinical settings as well as business organizations. The logic of a control chart analysis is similar to that which guides a visual inspection of a time series in applied behavior analysis (ABA). Departures from steady state functioning are investigated to detect changes in controlling variables. However, use of the scaling provided by control charts makes it possible to detect reliable treatment effects ("signals") that might be obscured by the "noisy" baselines obtained in many applied settings. Control limits also provide objective criteria that are more precise and replicable across investigators than are the subjective impressions which quide the unaided visual analysis of similar data.

Objectives: This workshop will provide participants with a practical, working knowledge of SPC data analytic techniques that are consistent with the goals of applied behavior analysis.

Activities: Introductory level reading materials will be provided to explain basic

terminology and procedures, with specific applications that cover the following topic: selecting appropriate control charts for the different types of data obtained in applied settings; using control charts to analyze baseline stability and to detect the presence of assignable causes of variation; constructing cause and effect diagrams to identify factors contributing to this variability; how to use SPC data analytic procedures on line to monitor treatment outcomes; and, use of control charts to make clinical decisions, such as "setting a new process aim" as part of a changing criterion design.

Target Audience: Clinicians and administrators working in applied settings who are interested in learning about the data analytic procedures that provide the empirical foundation for total quality management.

Behavioral, Instructional, and Medical Interventions for Children Diagnosed with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder.

GEORGE J. DUPAUL (Lehigh University -Bethlehem, PA), Gary Stoner (University of Oregon, Eugene, OR)

Description: The purpose of this 3-hour workshop is to provide state-of-the-art information about behavioral and instructional intervention strategies that are effective in enhancing the school and home performance of children diagnosed with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). The use of behavioral assessment data in determining response to stimulant medication also will be covered.

Objectives: The training objectives are: (1) Participants will be able to identify the most effective behavioral strategies for children with ADHD. (2) Participants will be knowledgeable of behavioral assessment techniques that can aid physicians in determining the effects of psychostimulant medications. (3) Participants will be able to apply antecedent-based interventions (e.g., changes to academic instruction) in the treatment of children with ADHD. (4) Participants will be able to apply consequentbased interventions (e.g., token reinforcement, response cost) in the treatment of children with ADHD. (5) Participants will be able to design strategies to enhance the maintenance and generalization of obtained treatment effects.

Activities: Workshop activities will include both didactic presentation of material and small/large group discussion of an application of behavioral techniques to sample cases. First, an overview of the various intervention strategies that have empirical support will be provided. Second, the application of behavioral assessment data to determining the effects of stimulant medications will be illustrated through examination of individual dose-response plots. Next, antecedent-based (e.g., posting of rules, effective command strategies, classwide peer tutoring) and consequent-based (e.g., token reinforcement, response cost) interventions will be described thoroughly. Fourth, strategies to enhance maintenance and generalization (e.g., self-management interventions) of treatment effects will be outlined. Finally, participants will work in small groups to generate an intervention plan for a sample case study. Each of the treatment plans will be examined and discussed in a large group format at the conclusion of the workshop.

Target Audience: The target audience includes school psychologists, clinical child

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psychologists, clinical social workers, as well as special education and general education teachers. Participants are expected to have a basic knowledge of ADHD and behavioral intervention strategies as this workshop is at the intermediate level.

## Teaching Behavior Analysis: How to Develop and Use Practice Sheets.

STEPHEN A. GRAF (Youngstown State University - Youngstown, OH)

Description: Practice Sheets represent a procedure to promote fluency in verbal behavior developed by Eric and Elizabeth Haughton and Harold Kunzelmann about 30 years ago. Learners see a wide sample of problems concerning a topic and attempt to produce appropriate responses during a timed interval. Practitioners construct auxiliary sheets with questions and answers or answers alone, which can be used for monitoring learner performance. Use of the techniques provides an efficient way to provide monitored practice towards fluency with sufficient examples and nonexamples.

Objectives: Participants should be able to: (1) Gain experience from learner viewpoint as they try practice sheet samples. (2) Develop practice sheet examples of content for their own area of interest following the guidelines provided and explained in the workshop. (3) Decide whether SAFMEDS or practice sheets would be more appropriate in a given situation. (4) Decide whether text or graphic practice sheets would be more appropriate in their applications. (5) Decide whether to invest in either of the Practice Sheeter software programs

available that generate practice sheets and answer sheets.

Activities: Activities include: (1) Practice with conversion of different types of information to practice sheets. (2) Discussion of guidelines developed by Elizabeth and Eric Haughton and Harold Kunzelmann for generating practice sheets. (3) Demonstration of choral responding technique with practice sheets. (4) Discussion of using software to generate practice sheets efficiently. (5) Demonstration of how to run timings with small or large groups. (6) Practice in use of Standard Celeration Charts to monitor practice sheets. (7) Discussion of how to incorporate SAFMEDS into larger patterns of learning.

Target Audience: Participants in this workshop should be interested in promoting fluent verbal behaviors via use of practice sheets.

JEANINE MOREAU (Specialized Behavioral Support Services, Inc. - Albuquerque, NM), Paula L. Farkas (Specialized Behavioral Support Services, Inc. - Albuquerque, NM)

Description: The Urgent Response Model has been developed to address the needs of community providers who serve persons with developmental disabilities who may also have a behavioral or psychiatric need.

When a community program experiences a sudden and/or unanticipated inability to provide adequate services to a person with challenging behaviors as a result of environmental changes, medication changes, situational changes or when a chronic ongoing situation has proved too challenging to manage with the current level of staffing, the Urgent Response mechanism may be deemed appropriate.

It is always the primary goal of the Urgent Response Project to assist community programs in becoming self sufficient in handling any and all situations in which we provide assistance. The Urgent Response team does not want community providers to become dependent upon this service for managing challenging or difficult behaviors. The team desires to enhance staff skills and training so that each program will eventually be able to handle most urgent situations on their own.

Objectives: (1) Participants will have an understanding of how and why the Urgent Response Project began. (2) Participants will have an understanding of the process in developing an Urgent Response Project. (3) Participants will experience actual crisis examples and practice prioritizing the crisis and practice crisis intervention techniques.

Activities: (1) Large group case examples and discussions. (2) Small group prioritization exercise. (3) Small group case examples and discussions.

**Target Audience:** All professionals who work with developmentally disabled populations.

Statistical Analysis of Applied Behavioral Data: Why, When, and How.

JOHN CROSBIE (West Virginia University - Morgantown, WV)

Description: One of the enduring problems for applied behavior analysts is how to assess change with their data. Assessing change is less difficult with data obtained in the animal lab over extended periods under conditions of tight experimental control. With typical applied behavioral data, however, there is generally more variability, and only a small number of observations. With such data visual inference is unreliable and lenient, and statistical procedures are frequently difficult to use or inappropriate. The purpose of this workshop is to describe the difficulties inherent in analyzing brief singlesubject data, and how a new interrupted time-series analysis procedure (ITSA-CORR) can overcome many of these difficulties.

Objectives: At the end of the workshop, participants will be able to: (1) Describe why visual inference is unreliable and lenient with typical applied behavioral data. (2) Describe why parametric statistical procedures such as ANOVA and nonparametric procedures such as the binomial test cannot control Type I error with single-subject data. (3) Describe how interrupted time-series analysis (ITSA) tackles these problems. (4) Perform and interpret three types of ITSA: TMS (Glass, Wilson, & Gottman, 1975), ITSE (Gottman, 1981), and ITSACORR (Crosbie, 1993).

Activities: In the first two hours there will be a lecture on the main theoretical points, interspersed with exercises performed by participants. During the final hour various computer programs will be demonstrated with published, invented, and participants' data (if time permits). ITSACORR can be purchased for \$99 after the workshop.

Target Audience: This workshop is provided for behavioral researchers, academics, and graduate students who want to improve their data analytic skills with timeseries data.

## The Picture Exchange Communication System for Children and Adults.

LORI FROST (Pyramid Educational Consultants - Cherry Hill, NJ), Andrew S. Bondy (Delaware Autistic Program - Newark, DE)

Description: The Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS) is an initial lanquage training package that is used to rapidly teach communication skills to those with limited functional speech. We previously have addressed theoretical and clinical issues related to the PECS training package (Bondy & Frost, 1992; Bondy & Frost, 1993; Bondy and Frost, 1994). Initially, PECS was used to teach young children with autism an effective means of communicating. During the past few years, PECS has been increasingly introduced as a functional communication system with individuals with social/communication deficits of all ages. PECS is a unique training program that does not require lengthy prerequisite training, and that promotes

communication in a social context that the user initiates. Rather than building to spontaneity, as promoted by many other systems, PECS begins with spontaneous actions. The sequence of PECS training's incorporates an individual's lack of sensitivity to socially-mediated reinforcers. It begins by teaching a pure mand repertoire and goes on to teach intraverbals, tacts, and mixed functions in accordance with Skinner's (1957) analysis of verbal behavior. Procedures associated with teaching these operants will be presented in a manner consistent with Skinner's analysis.

We will present a history of communication training programs and a comparison of PECS to these programs. A detailed training protocol, accompanied by a discussion of training procedures consistent with applied behavior analytic strategies, will be reviewed. Effective modifications for older populations and for those with various sensory impairments will be described. Data regarding rate of acquisition of the different operants will be provided. Data also will be presented on the large proportion of young children who acquire independent and functional speech after using PECS for more than one year. Finally, issues pertaining to parent and staff training will be addressed.

Objectives: (1) To provide an historical and theoretical overview of the language training programs used with nonverbal individuals. (2) To provide a detailed description of the Picture Exchange Communication System and its relationship to verbal behavior using Skinner's (1957) description of verbal operants. (3) To teach participants the procedural details and instructional techniques related to a behavior analytic orientation involved in implementing PECS with young children with autism. (4) To teach implementation strategies associated with PECS for adolescents and

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adults with autism and related developmental disabilities.

Activities: (1) Lecture. (2) Demonstration of procedures. (3) Video tape of individuals at each level of training. (4) Role playing and direct feedback.

Target Audience: Participants will be those involved with students/clients with severe communication deficits who learn how to implement a unique communication training package.

A Behavioral Diagnostic Paradigm for Integrating Behavior Analytic and Psychopharmacological Interventions for Dually Diagnosed Individuals (Mentally III and Developmentally Disabled).

DAVID A. M. PYLES (W. A. Howe Developmental Center - Tinley Park, IL)

Description: It can be very difficult to differentiate the functions of maladaptive behaviors that are the result of many years of institutionalization form those that are psychiatrically based. In addition, clients who have severely limited verbal repertoires often express pain or discomfort through aggression, crying, or engaging in bizarre behaviors that can mimic diagnostic criteria under the DSM-IIIR or DSM IV.

In order to provide the most appropriate treatment, a hypothesis testing approach is used. First, hypotheses about possible functions of the behavior are derived. The Interdisciplinary Team process is critical for determining a plan to derive and rule out hypotheses. Next, the individual is

examined to rule out pain, discomfort, drug side effects, or other physiological conditions that may result in maladaptive behavior. If these variables are discovered, appropriate interventions are implemented, and data collected on an ongoing basis. Third, functional and ecological variables are examined to determine the situations yielding differential probabilities of appropriate and maladaptive behaviors, Informal. descriptive, and experimental analyses are used in this process. Interventions based on these analyses are then implemented and evaluated. If hypothesis-based interventions are not effective, or if functional/ecological variables are not discovered, then psychopharmacological interventions may be necessary. Data are collected on the behaviors that comprise the DSM-IIIR or DSM-IV criteria.

Objectives: How does the Interdisciplinary Team process interface with this treatment paradigm? How is the function of behavior determined? How should interventions be staged? When is it appropriate to consult the psychiatrist, and what kinds of information should be provided? How are data used in the process?

Activities: The use of a flow chart will be used to diagram the sequence of activities involved in conducting a Behavioral Diagnosis (Bailey & Pyles, 1989) and integrating it with psychopharmacological treatment. Methods for determining causes of behavior and resulting interventions will be discussed and presented on overhead transparencies. The process of ongoing data collection and evaluation, and their respective roles in assessing treatment efficacy will be presented for determining ethical, practical, and effective treatment interventions for addressing severe maladaptive behaviors. Methods of graphing data to analyze the effectiveness of psychopharmacological interventions will be included.

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Target Audience: Behavior Analysts, Psychologists, Psychiatrists, Social Workers, QMRPs, and others who work with individuals who engage in severe maladaptive behaviors or who are dually diagnosed.

## Consulting in Educational Settings: A Social Influence Model for Promoting Cooperation.

RONNIE DETRICH (Spectrum Center - Berkeley, CA), Kari Bartlebaugh (Spectrum Center for Educational and Behavioral Development, Berkeley, CA)

Description: Consulting within any setting requires two sets of competencies: (1) technical skills in behavior analysis (2) social influence skills so that direct service providers will implement our recommendations. Historically, behavior analysts have concentrated more on the development of technical skills and relatively little formal attention has been given to social influence skills. Ironically, if we are not successful at social influence then our technical competencies become irrelevant.

In the workshop, social influence will be defined and participants will be given: (a) strategies for promoting cooperation (b) tactics for establishing common goals (c) a conceptual model that allows the consultant to use the educational staff's motivation to gain cooperation from the teaching staff.

Activities: The teaching format will include didactic instruction, group discussion of the

issues, examples of actual cases and the group will determine how to proceed, and discussion of their own projects. Participants will be provided handouts that summarize the major components of these social influence model and worksheets they can use to guide their practice as they begin to apply the principles that were learned in this workshop.

Target Audience: This workshop is appropriate for anyone that works in educational settings who provide services to children through direct service staff. This would include private behavioral consultants, school psychologists, school social workers, etc. No prerequisite skills are required and participants are encouraged to bring specific projects for discussion and problem solving.

## Behavioral Psychotherapy: A Radical Approach.

STEVEN ZLUTNICK (University of San Francisco - San Francisco, CA)

Description: Only a few practitioners have applied the radical behavioral approach to more traditional psychotherapy. More to the point, however, has been a paucity of attempts to address issues that traditional, non-behavioral clinicians rightly deem critical to the therapeutic process. These include therapist variables such as maturity, self-disclosure and common sense, developmental issues such as divorce, separation, individuation, etc., values clarification and conflict, caring and concern. Attempts to translate, incorporate or integrate rather than discount such controversial topics as transference, counter transference, insight,

resistance, the need for long term therapy, etc., are rare.

Objectives: The goals of this workshop include: (1) A chance for the participant in clinical practice to integrate the seemingly disparate views of radical behaviorism and traditional clinical psychology. (2) The opportunity for clinicians teaching applied courses in behavior therapy to develop coherent, reasonable explanations to students who are attempting to reconcile these issues during their training. (3) An opportunity to address and discuss issues and concepts historically avoided and discounted in "traditional" behavior therapy training environments.

Activities: Activities will include brief didactic presentations by the presenter designed to facilitate discussion as well as a mutual generation of topics and agenda by the presenter and participants.

Target Audience: All levels, although preference during discussions will be given to advanced practitioners and trainers.

The C-BAD System: Assessing, Diagnosing, and Prescribing Behavioral Interventions.

ENNIO CIPANI (California School of Professional Psychology - Fresno, CA)

Description: The current proposal will present a behavioral assessment-diagnosticprescriptive model to use in treating individuals with severe behavior or learning problems. The workshop will focus on a specific set of procedures for the professional to utilize in assessing and subsequently designing a behavioral intervention plan for clients referred for behavioral consultation and evaluation. Participants will be trained on the C-BAD System.

Objectives: The following skills will be taught to participants: (1) Ability to contrast differences between a traditional diagnostic system and a behavioral diagnostic system. (2) Ability to delineate characteristics of a behavioral diagnostic approach. (3) Ability to collect relevant data through interview, observation, and hypothesis testing using the C-BAD Manual. (4) Ability to identify four environmental functions a problem behavior may serve and use such as a basis for diagnosis. (5) Ability to identify antecedent behavior relationships. (6) Ability to identify alternative-replacement behavior(s) for each function. (7) Ability to identify a functional treatment, given diagnosis of problem and replacement behaviors. (8) Ability to identify current, effective, nonaversive strategies.

Activities: Activities include using the Report Writing Manual to diagnose a presented case study.

Target Audience: All Professionals working with children, adolescents and adults with special needs who write behavior programs, evaluate such programs and/or review proposed behavior programs in committees, client advocates, and administrators who also review proposed behavior programs. Also, faculty teaching behavior analysis courses and supervising practicum will find the manual useful as a way to develop report writing skills of the behavioral assessment and treatment plans.

The Award for Effective Presentation of Behavior Analysis in the Mass Media is being awarded to Gary Wilkes of Behavior Modification and Training Services, Mesa, Arizona in recognition of his contribution in presenting the principles of behavior analysis to the general public an accurate, concise, and yet, easily understood manner. The committee was impressed not only with a unique focus of media attention on operant animal behavior, but also with the staggering number of readers (3 to 20 million) reached on a continuing weekly basis by his column in the *New York Times*.

The Award for Distinguished Service to Behavior Analysis will be received by Victor G. Laties of the University of Rochester for his long and illustrious contribution to the field of behavior analysis. Beginning his first academic appointment in 1955 at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, he has served numerous editorial positions, supported more than a dozen professional organizations, served as an ongoing member of a number of national advisory science and research review committees, and his list of publications is pages long, with the main emphasis on behavioral psychopharmacology and schedules of reinforcement.

The Award for Excellence in Behavior Analysis in the Public Service is awarded to Gina Green of The New England Center for Autism for her outstanding service in upholding the merits of scientific scrutiny in the field of special education. She is well-known for her research in stimulus equivalence and in establishing behaviorally-based treatment programs, but this award is based more on her recent notoriety as spokesperson for researchers investigation the validity of facilitated communication. She has give information used in 30 legal hearings, testified in 6, and been scientific advisor to three nationally televised documentaries: PBS Frontline: Prisoner of Silence, NBC Now, and CBS 60 Minutes.

## A Dozen Common Teaching Mistakes and What to Do Instead.

WILLIAM L. HEWARD (Ohio State University - Columbus, OH), Patricia M. Barbetta (Florida International University, Miami, FL), Rodney A. Cavanaugh (SUNY at Plattsburgh, NY) and Teresa A. Grossi (University of Toledo, Toledo, OH)

**Description:** This workshop will focus on twelve teaching mistakes committed frequently by teachers across curriculum areas and at all grade levels.

Objectives: After completing the workshop, participants should be able to (a) recognize the teaching mistakes in the lessons they plan and deliver, and (b) incorporate several of the "what to do instead" strategies and tactics into their own teaching.

Activities: Each mistake and the recommended alternatives (i.e., "What To Do Instead") will be presented in a three-part format. First, the mistake and examples of its occurrence will be presented and/or demonstrated with the audience (e.g., Mistake #3 - Asking students, "Do you understand?"). Second, logical and empirical rationale will be offered for why teachers should eliminate or greatly reduce the frequency with which they commit the mistake. Third, one or more classroom tested. empirically-supported alternative strategies will be presented, demonstrated, and/or practiced by participants. Participants will leave the workshop with a completed set of guided notes, annotated reference list, and sample instructional materials.

Target Audience: Teachers and those who are preparing to become teachers of all

types of learners at all levels (preschool, elementary, secondary, higher education).

Beyond Consequences: How to Use Stimulus Control Procedures in Applied Settings.

MICHAEL J. CAMERON (Evergreen Center - Milford, MA)

Description: Despite the deep historical roots of stimulus-based interventions (Itard, 1800) and the demonstrated efficacy of these procedures (Munk & Repp, 1994) our behavior lexicon, literature, and professional practices reflect a behavioral culture that is more inclined to use "consequence control" rather than "stimulus control" technology. Accordingly, the purpose of this workshop is to provide an overview of stimulus control procedures that can be used for affecting the behavior of persons with developmental disabilities.

Objectives: Procedures based on the concepts of setting events, response covariation, behavioral momentum, and transfer of stimulus control will be compared and contrasted to "consequence control" methods for changing behavior. Moreover, workshop participants will be guided to consider ecobehavioral conditions such as crowding, noise levels, lighting and other environmental conditions that may impact on a person's ability to learn and engage in socially appropriate behavior.

Activities: Workshop presenters will discuss the sociological factors contributing to the widespread use of consequence control methodologies and will rely on a data-based, case study format to demonstrate the economy and efficacy of stimulus control technology. The overall goal of this workshop is to expand the procedural repertoire of applied clinicians serving adults and children with developmental disabilities.

Target Audience: Anyone who works with persons with developmental disabilities and has the responsibility for the deceleration of challenging behaviors and uses primarily consequence-based applied behavior analysis procedures to achieve this deceleration.

#### Anxiety Management Training.

RICHARD M. SUINN (Colorado State University - Ft. Collins, CO)

Description: Anxiety Management Training (AMT) is a brief, behavioral intervention that emphasizes self-control of anxiety or of anger through the application of relaxation, guided rehearsal, anxiety induction and control, and homework assignments.

Objectives: Objective will be on training in the exact AMT steps, presented through demonstration, slide-lecture, and handouts.

Activities: Materials involve sample case illustrations. Emphasis will be from a practitioner orientation, with research findings to demonstrate the various clinical/practice applications of AMT. Such applications include generalized anxiety disorder, hypertension, cognitive ruminations, Type A behaviors, anger and aggression, and sports performance. AMT is suitable to a

diverse clientele, ranging from stress management consultation with executives and business personnel, to sports consultation, police or other occupations facing high risk stress, and other persons whose stress or anxiety requires relief. The anger control applications of AMT also broadens the opportunities for services as the control of aggression has become a community and national issue.

Target Audience: Target audience includes clinicians and researchers interested in an intervention for anxiety/anger control.

## Defining an Acceptable Treatment Environment.

JAMES F. MCGIMSEY (Au Clair Program -Mount Dora, FL), Gretchen Jacobs (Au Clair Program, Mount Dora, FL)

**Description:** Treatment environments for people with a variety of disabilities have steadily evolved over the last decades. The methods of habilitation and treatment have advanced, as have the overall service delivery systems of which they are a part. The primitive methods of teaching skills and treating behavioral problems applied within custodial, institutional environments have been steadily replaced by more effective, systematic, and well-conceived strategies of active treatment provided by more humane and therapeutic living environments. Despite the undeniable progress seen, the definition of the precise elements that constitute an acceptable treatment environment remain very much an issue of discussion and debate. Regardless of how valid an environment or process might appear at

face value, all dimensions of a program's adequacy must be analyzed for effectiveness and efficiency in benefiting its clients. In short, the definition of an effective treatment environment must be functional, specifying how its individual aspects and milieu actually affect the behavior of individuals within it. Thus the question of what defines an acceptable treatment environment may be productively addressed by developing a process of systematically analyzing the functional impact of an environment piece by piece, and where effects are found inadequate, examining and reordering the process.

Objectives: This workshop will focus on how an emphasis on functional effects alters the way an acceptable treatment environment is defined along a number of specific parameters, and how it changes the practices in that environment that are designed to promote acceptable and effective treatment.

Activities: Participants will learn to isolate and define a number of such environmental parameters, and will learn methods of assessing the impact of these parameters, on the acceptability and effectiveness of the overall treatment environment.

Target Audience: This workshop is designed for individuals who develop, administer, and practice in therapeutic environments for a variety of disabilities.

Objectives: (1) Identify specific wording in legislation up for reauthorization for which modification would improve chances that legislated programs will be effective. (2) Identify organizations and agencies that would be appropriate members of a coalition with behavior analysts to lobby legislators. (3) Develop talking points and letters to use as the basis for discussions with and mailings to legislators.

Activities: Participants will work in groups to read and recommend changes to existing legislation that is slated for reauthorization in the 104th Congress and that might have an impact on the adoption of effective social/educational programs.

For each piece of legislation, the working groups will identify organizations and agencies that could work in coalition with behavior analysts to institute changes in legislation. Participants will develop talking points and letters for discussion with legislators.

Target Audience: Behavior analysts who wish to influence legislation for the purpose of ensuring the adoption of more effective social and educational programs.

"Evolution and Behavior: Selection by Consequences as a Unifying Theme."

PAUL THOMAS ANDRONIS (Northern Michigan University)

Description: Parallels between organic evolution and the selection of behavior by its consequences have recently provided compelling formal models for analyzing operant behavior and relating research in the experimental analysis of behavior to mainstream biological theory. Many behavior analysts (and psychologists alike) have only a rudimentary understanding of evolutionary theory, often with an incorrect grasp of some of its more subtle points (fostered by prevalent "popular" views of evolution). This workshop will first introduce participants to modern evolutionary theory, focusing on several of its major themes, including the critical attributes of evolution by natural selection (e.g., variability, selection, and retention; panselectionism vs. neutral selection), organic and environmental bases of variability (e.g., genetic and epigenetic), the pace of evolutionary change (gradual and punctate), the outcomes of selection (adaptation/exaptation), and units of selection (e.g., genes, suites or characters, individuals, and populations). There will be a brief discussion of the impact of organic evolution on behavior, within a framework derived from classical ethology and modern neurobiology; accordingly several topics, like anatomical homology, functional equivalence, and Morgan's canon, and their theoretical importance, will be included for their relevance to the analysis of evolution and behavior. This discussion will address some of the more thoughtful criticisms of the experimental analysis of behavior made by ethologists and comparative psychologists. The instructor will then highlight

certain formal similarities between organic evolution and the ontogenic selection of behavior by its consequences, and also note some important differences between them. Finally, the instructor will introduce some evolutionary concepts, like the so-called "founder effect" and neoteny, that have not yet acquired currency as useful formal models for understanding the establishment of operant behavior.

Objectives: At the end of this workshop, participants should be able to: (1) describe the critical attributes of organic evolutionary theory; (2) distinguish between panselectionism and the "neutral theory" of evolution; (3) state the major sources of genetic variability: (4) briefly describe the molecular basis for retention of heritable characters and the mechanism of their expression: (5) state what is meant by punctuated equilibrium, and distinguish this mode from the traditional gradualist view of evolutionary change; (6) distinguish between "adaptations" and what Gould & Vrba have called "expectations"; (7) identify formal parallels between processes involved in organic evolution and the establishment of operant behavior; (8) apply correct evolutionary reasoning to such important issues in the analysis of behavior as the roles of instruction and rule-governance, symptom choice in clinically important patterns of behavior. the place of "innate" factors in human operant behavior, and the role of controlled behavioral variability in creative or insightful problem solving.

Activities: The didactic portion will be conducted in a lecture/discussion format. Participants will complete a series of brief "hands-on" exercises demonstrating several important evolutionary principles. Participants will be given a set of selected reading covering the major themes of the workshop.

Target Audience: Behavior analysts interested in evolutionary theory as an important

and necessary content area of behavior analysis, and as a source of useful formal models for furthering the analysis of behavior governed by its consequences. Academic Level: Intermediate



### CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR 1996 ABA AWARDS

(2) The information imparted must be for general public consumption and, therefore, cannot be published in a professional journal or newsletter or any other media intended solely for consumption by professionals in the field. (3) The awardee does not have to be a member of ABA.

Award for Distinguished Service to Behavior Analysis. This award is to be given to an individual who has demonstrated a sustained, valuable contribution to behavior analysis over a period of years in teaching, research, and/or practice. The awardee does not have to be a member of ABA.

Award for Excellence in Behavior Analysis in the Public Service. This award is given to an individual who works in the public or private sector who addresses socially significant problem using methods directly linked to behavior analysis or which effectively incorporate behavioral principles. This award may be given regardless of the terminology employed or the explanation offered by the person responsible for the application. The awardee does not have to be a member of ABA.


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
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
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
