PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

PRE-CONVENTION INSTITUTE: A series of workshops are offered prior to the convention for persons interested in intensive training in a specific area of study. Registration and materials fees are required.

CONTINUING EDUCATION: In addition to those offered during the Pre-Convention Institute, workshops are offered for continuing education throughout the convention and are identified as such in the Program. The Association has been granted full approval by the American Psychological Association to sponsor continuing education for psychologists.

BEHAVIOR ANALYST CERTIFICATION: An examination for eligibility for certification as a behavior analyst in a specialty area is offered on two occasions during the Convention. Passing this examination provides the opportunity for eventual consideration for certification by a specialty board of the Association. A complete description is included in this book. Registration is required.

INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION: The Association was established as an international organization in 1979. Presenters from many countries are included in the convention program.

CONVENTION PROGRAM: The Convention program is arranged in specialty areas which conveniently separate the various areas of study in behavior analysis. The various formats of presentations within each of these areas include:

<u>Invited Addresses</u>. The Association invites distinguished individuals to present papers throughout the Convention.

<u>Symposia</u>. A symposium consists of several paper presentations on a related topic delivered by persons from different research, service, or academic institutions.

<u>Papers</u>. Paper sessions are shorter (15-20 min) presentations of a research project delivered by one person. Two or three papers in a specialty area are often combined for a one-hour presentation.

<u>Seminars</u>. These sessions provide the opportunity for practical training in the fields of behavior analysis. A wide range of topics are presented, and a seminar may require pre-requisite skills. Many of the seminars emphasize techniques for behavior change and provide materials so that the participant may continue to use the techniques upon returning to their research or service sites. Registration and materials fees are required.

<u>Poster Sessions</u>. Information relevant to a research project is posted on a large board and the author remains available for 1½ hours to discuss the project. This format provides the opportunity for discussion between the presenter and the audience. One prize for excellence is awarded by the poster session host of each specialty area presented.

<u>Conversation Hours</u>. Conversation hours follow many invited addresses and invited symposia and provide an excellent opportunity for convention registrants to interact directly with the presenters.

Business Meetings. Business meetings for the various interest groups and committees within the Association are scheduled during the Convention to provide an opportunity for members to express opinions to the representatives of the group conducting the meeting and to the Association. When so indicated, these meetings are open to all interested persons.

ABA CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAM



THE ASSOCIATION FOR BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS IS APPROVED BY THE AMERICAN PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION TO SPONSOR CONTINUING EDUCATION IN PSYCHOLOGY Full approval granted October, 1979.

One of the primary objectives of the Association for Behavior Analysis is to provide educational opportunities for members and other professionals to review recent research, discuss current theoretical issues, and learn new methods of the application of behavior analysis to societal problems. While the Association does not require participation in the continuing education program for Association membership, the Association strongly recommends involvement in the program. The continuing education program does not provide the necessary educational foundation for entry into the discipline of psychology, nor is the program intended to prepare individuals to alter the direction of a professional career. The continuing education program is designed to meet the academic needs of self-improvement and to provide continuing academic training as required by many licensing associations and specialty boards.

The continuing education program consists of the identified offerings during the Pre-Convention Institute and a series of identified workshops offered during the convention. The continuing education program has been arranged to permit convention participants to enroll in a number of workshops which have been identified by area of study and continuing education credits. The following statement will accompany approved workshops:

"The Association for Behavior Analysis is approved by the American Psychological Association to sponsor continuing education in psychology. The following program is offered for ___ hours of continuing education credit."

(One contact hour equals one credit hour.)

The record of these continuing education credits, which are NOT equivalent to university credit hours, will be recorded by the Association and the American Psychological Association Continuing Education Credit Registry. Participants will be provided documentation of the earned credits, and a record of continuing education will be maintained by the Association. Members of the Association can indicate their desire for particular topics in future continuing education offerings by completing a "needs assessment" survey at the Convention.

Please refer to the registration instructions for the procedures to enroll in the continuing education program.

SPECIALTY AREA SEMINARS

Specialty area seminars are offered as a part of the convention program, but are not awarded continuing education credit. These programs are intended to provide an instructional activity which may include a workshop, seminar, or lecture format, but will not include the participant assessment and evaluation requirements of the continuing education courses. Accordingly, records of participation in the specialty area seminars are not maintained by the Association. Please refer to the registration instructions for enrolling in the specialty area seminars.

The various offerings are identified as introductory, intermediate, or advanced. The introductory seminars are those which require no prior knowledge of behavior analysis; the intermediate seminars require knowledge of behavior analysis; and the advanced seminars require knowledge of behavior analysis and familiarity with the content of the specific topical area in which the seminar is offered.

PRE-CONVENTION INSTITUTE

While the Pre-Convention Institute is not a formal prerequisite for entry into the convention workshops, the offerings of the Institute and the convention have been arranged, where possible, to take advantage of the sequential nature of the subject matter. Note that enrollment in the Pre-Convention Institute is by ADVANCED REGISTRATION ONLY; registration must be received by May 1. Enrollment is limited to 30 persons per workshop/seminar.

ABA CERTIFICATION EXAM ANNOUNCEMENT

What Is It?

This is the third year that ABA is offering a general exam as the first stage of certification as a Behavior Analyst. The purpose of the general exam is to assess the applicant's verbal competency with respect to basic behavioral principles and to establish the applicant's eligibility for his/her practicing or specialty competency in behavior analysis (stage two of the ABA certification). The form of the exam is multiple choice with some essays including analysis of "behavioral vignettes". The second stage of certification involves a more extensive assessment and monitoring of performance in an area of specialization (e.g. behavior clinical, behavior analysis in education).

Who Can Take It?

Eligibility criteria for taking the general exam are: 1) working on minimal degree required in one's area of professional training in the human services; and 2) membership in ABA (full, student, or affiliate).

Why Certify?

Certification allows the professional some formal indicator of his/her competence as a practicing behavior analyst. In addition, current professional licensing or certification procedures in some disciplines, particularly

psychology, are limited to doctoral level practitioners. Yet within the field of behavior analysis there are now professional Masters level practitioners who must be able to document their professional competency. And finally, some individuals may want certification for their own professional growth.

How Can I Prepare for the General Exam?

A list of suggested readings and study guides may be obtained from Linda Parrott, Department of Psychology, West Virginia University, Morgantown, WV 26506.

How Do I Register?

Preregistration is encouraged. To preregister, submit fees along with the registration form for the Convention or the Pre-convention Institute. On site registration may be accomplished ath the Pre-convention Institute registration desk or the Convention registration desk during scheduled hours. The fee is \$30.00 per applicant for preregistrants, \$35.00 for on-site registrants.

When Will I Learn About My Test Results?

The ABA Certification Board will score the exams and notify applicants of their performance within 6 weeks of taking the test. Applicants will be informed of those areas in which their performances were deficient. The exam may be retaken as often as necessary to achieve proficient performance. Exam scores will not be released to persons other than the Certification or Specialty Board Members without the applicant's written permission.




THE SOCIETY FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS SABA





ARTICLE III: MEMBERSHIP

- The Association for Behavior Analysis shall consist of one class of members entitled to the rights and privileges of ABA without restriction.
- 2. An applicant for Full Member Status shall:
 - A. Possess the minimum of a Master's degree in psychology or a related field.
 - B. Demonstrate competence in either the experimental or applied analysis of behavior.

Such a competency in the experimental analysis of behavior may be demonstrated by the applicants submitting evidence that their training included a minimum of one year's supervised laboratory research and that the applicant's graduate project, thesis, or dissertation was an experimental analysis of behavior investigation.

Such a competency in the applied analysis of behavior may be demonstrated by the applicants providing evidence that their training included a minimum of one year's supervised practicum experience in the applied analysis of behavior and that the applicant's graduate project, thesis, or dissertation was an applied analysis of behavior investigation.

Applicants whose formal training did not include the above experiences may:

C. Demonstrate their competency in behavior analysis by submitting evidence of two or more years supervised experience in the experimental or applied analysis of behavior.

OR

D. By making significant contributions to knowledge in behavior analysis as evidenced by research publications or by such other means as may be determined by the ABA Membership Committee.

Anyone not meeting the qualifications stated in Article III (2), may petition for Full Member status by:

- E. Submitting all pertinent information to the ABA Membership Committee.
- There shall be a class of participants designated as Affiliates who shall have such privileges as may be granted by the Council. Applications for Affiliate Status must be accompanied by a recommendation from a Full Member of ABA,
 - A. There shall be a class of participants designated as Student Affiliates who shall have such privileges as may be granted by the Council.
